**What are three main points that the clergy should know about “Clearing up a Criminal Record”?**

- Cleaning up a record reduces barriers to employment, housing, education, and community engagement. It also helps reduce recidivism, making our communities safer.
- The laws in California have changed to make it easier for people with criminal records to clean up their records or at least to ameliorate the effects of that criminal record.
- The San Diego County Public Defender and the San Diego County District Attorney’s Office can assist a person in cleaning up their criminal record.

**What are three ways in which clergy can help their congregants?**

- Encourage members of their congregations to take steps to clear up criminal records and to encourage family members or friends to clear up their criminal records
- Educate their congregants on the impact a criminal record can have on a person’s life and livelihood and to make sure their congregants realize that the criminal justice system in San Diego County is here to help clear up their record where the law allows.
