## I. **GENERAL COMMENTS**:

All log sheets for several years' worth of juvenile detentions are kept in one notebook. Some detentions are placed in the wrong month even though the summary reports to the Board of State and Community Corrections seem to be accurate.

Note: This facility is scheduled to be remodeled soon.

## II. <u>RECOMMENDATIONS (if any)</u>:

- 1. Fully identify the age of the minor as some ages were missing from the logs.
- 2. Have food on the premises instead of an envelope of money to spend at nearby fast food restaurants.
- 3. Make sure that all deputies accurately put detentions in the correct monthly log instead of having the Administrative Sergeant later correct mistakes.
- 4. Identify (as mother, father, aunt, uncle, etc.) the person to whom the juvenile was released.
- 5. We recommend the Sheriff's Department conduct LGBTQI+ training for officers.
- 6. We recommend that sensitive reports be taken in a private setting rather than in the lobby.
