I. **GENERAL COMMENTS**:

Mid-City Division keeps an online record of their detention logs; we reviewed half of the detention logs online and half on paper. Mid-City does not allow any juvenile detention to go over the 6-hour limit, as they do not have any access to secure detention cells, as the cells do not have locks. Mid-City has 2 SRO's, a Detective and a Sergeant in the Juvenile Field Team; they support school police and charter schools within the division. Overall SDPD – Mid-City Division had a total of 96 non-secure detentions and 0 secure detentions.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

- 1. BSCC forms and reporting requirements have recently changed. The JJDPA and WIC §206 and §207 prohibit the Secure detention of status offenders (WIC §601) and nonoffenders (WIC §300/WIC §5150). Any violations must be reported to the BSCC on the Monthly Report on the Detention of Minors. - 2. We recommend that Mid-City Division keep a printed copy of each monthly and yearly report of their division detentions on hand for at least two years (current and past) for future juvenile justice jails and locks-up inspections. We also recommend that the division be prepared with blankets and change of clothes should a minor require any spare clothes or need to be warm.

The following questions are used to assess compliance with the state standards governing law enforcement facilities in which minors are held in temporary custody. See Article 9, *Minors in Temporary Custody in a Law Enforcement Facility*, Title 15 of the California Code of Regulations (15 Cal. Code Regs. §§ 1140–1151).
