I. GENERAL COMMENTS:

The Western Division Police Department is relatively small, having detained only approximately 110 minors in the 2012 calendar year. It has two (side-by-side) holding cells to accommodate secure and unsecure detentions of both minors and adults. One cell has a disabled lock on the door and no rail for cuffing detainees. The other is lockable and has a cuffing rail. There is a solid wall between the rooms and doors (rather than bars) in front. This affords some reduction of sight or sound contact potentials between adult and minor detainees.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

- Single poster with secure and non-secure requirements; checklists for admonitions of same to minors recommended.
- Signage regarding intoxicated minors recommended.
- Presence of both "secure" and "non-secure" log format recommended.
- Supplies or warm blankets and appropriate clothing articles for minors recommended.
