## I. GENERAL COMMENTS:

This year's lockup inspection included detentions from 2019 and 2020. Due to the COVID outbreak a lockup inspection was not conducted in 2020.

The facility is well maintained, and all procedures and regulations conform to existing laws. Staff was very friendly, answered all my questions, and accommodated my request to be in private when reviewing the Non-Secure and Secure Logs. Even though they have a diversion option, they do not have a diverse amount of youth services that are culturally appropriate for the population.

## II. RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

The Juvenile Justice Commission recommends to:

- 1. Work with University partners and the Sheriff's Department to locate and partner with youth services that can support law enforcement divert youth away from the criminal justice system prior to recommending the case to the District Attorney's office.
- Continue strengthening community outreach campaigns that builds relationships with community members and non-profit organizations. This can assist in discovering new diversion options for youth.
