I. GENERAL COMMENTS:

The Rancho San Diego Station is clean, well-lit and includes a designated area for minors-only with a separate entrance, separate holding area, separate restroom and a desk/computer set up for processing. Signs are posted on the doors and walls that explain minors' rights, with one exception (see below).

There are no separate spaces for male, female and/or non-binary or transgendered minors to be held. It appears that this is infrequently an issue given the number of juveniles seen on site. In the logs, notes are made if minors require separating. If there are no adults being held in lock-up, the adult holding area can be used (note that minors are still not placed in a cell). More commonly, it was reported that additional minors would sit with an officer at the officer's desk in a separate area.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

Signage outlining minors' rights need to be updated. Currently, signs explaining minor's rights do not include the six-hour hold limit. This detail is in an orientation binder and is supposed to be disclosed verbally by the officer on watch, but signs should also include the six-hour limit. This was discussed with Michael Alcarion and will be followed-up on during the next visual inspection.

Careful and accurate reporting of minors held over six hours is recommended, as Rancho SDSO under-reported the number of minors held over the six-hour limit. While the total number of secure detentions reported in 2019 (four) and 2020 (three) were correct, errors in reporting >6-hour holds were found in both years. One additional >6 hour hold in each year should have been reported. The logs clearly documented the actual length that the minors were held (see details below), but BSCC monthly reporting logs were incorrect. This was also discussed with Michael Alcarion, and the reviewing JCC member requested that corrections be sent to BSCC.

One female minor was held over six hours on August 24, 2019 (1600 - 2245 hours). This 17-yearold had an initial 245 (a) (i) PC charge, but it was discovered that she was a victim of Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) who was defending herself. The reason she was held longer was because outside investigators with specific Human Trafficking expertise were called in to interview her and determine the safest way to proceed. She was released to her mother. Per Rancho's monthly BSCC report logs, their report does need to be amended: they reported four non-secure holds of minors for less than six hours, when it should have been reported that three non-secure holds of minors occurred for less than six hours, and one youth was held (non-secure) for more than six hours.

Two 17-year-old male minors were held over six hours on April 15, 2020 (0330 - 0949 hours; 0500 - 1115 hours) on a 245 PC with multiple people injured, one of whom it seems may have been a fatality. An adult was also involved (no details in the report on the minors). It seems multiple investigators were brought in to talk with the minors separately, and one was released directly to his mother while the other went to Juvenile Hall. The severity of the criminal activity, the number of people injured and the need to have multiple investigators brought to the station for separate questioning contributed to the length of their hold. The report to BSCC does need to be amended as Rancho only reported one youth held over six hours in April (one secure <6 hours and one secure >6 hours were reported), when in fact two minors were held over the six-hour limit and none were held less than 6 hours.
